Respect of the property rights of the owners who have been surviving for years should be the main consideration.

Another solution for lack of water should be pursued and the expense of bringing the water to southern Nevada should be spent on a more permanent solution. Trade off the Colorado River supply that goes to so-Cal by financing the construction of desalination plants to supply a like amount of water for southern California.

As you can see,I'm against the rural groundwater plan unless it would only be for the annual replacement supply amount,but the expense would not be warranted for the small supply that normally occurs.
